What is the Early Years Foundation Stage?

The Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS) is the stage of education for children from birth to the end of the Reception year.

It is based on the recognition that children learn best through play and active learning.







 The ways a child engages with other people and the environment underpins learning and development across all areas.

 These are called 'The Characteristics of Effective Learning' and happen through;

Playing and exploring - finding out and exploring

Engagement - playing with what they know

- being willing to have a go

Active learning - being involved and concentrating

- keeping trying

- enjoying achieving what they set out to do

Creating and thinking - having their own ideas

critically - making links

Thinking - working with ideas

Communication and Language Physical Development






Personal, Social and Emotional Development

Communication and Language



The children will be learning to:

- Use language in play, recreating roles and expriences;
- listen attentively and make comments about what they hear;
- enjoy listening to stories, songs and poems and retell them;
- hold a conversation with teachers and peers;
- 'express their ideas and feelings using full sentences.
- extend their vocabulary, learning new words.



Physical Development





The children will be learning to:

- Negotiate space and obstacles safely;
- Move energetically such as running, jumping, dancing, climbing and hopping;
- Use a range of small tools including cutlery, scissors and paintbrushes;
- hold a pencil using a tripod grip;
- know how to stay healthy and safe through diet and lifestyle;
- dress themselves and manage own hygiene





Specific areas of learning

Literacy

The children will be learning to:

Say a sound for each letter of the alphabet and at least 10 digraphs;

read words by sound blending;
read simple sentences and books;
write recognisable letters,
mostly correctly formed;
write simple sentences that can
be read by others with a capital
letter and full stop.


spell words using the sounds they know in the correct order.

We learn how to use Fred Fingers for spelling words.














Mathematics- number

 develop a deep understanding of number to 10reading, writing and recognising quantities without counting;


 count beyond 20, understanding patterns in the counting system;


 recall number facts to 10- addition and subtraction facts without using practical apparatus;

Understanding the World






- Understand changes in the world around them such as the seasons and changing states of matter like water;

- Know some similarities and differences between different religious and cultural communities in this country.






Attendance is an important part of your Child's Education, they can not learn if they are not in school. Attendance = Attainment Every Day Counts


You are legally responsible for ensuring your child attends school every day and on time. Persistent lateness can add up to too many days absent.

When a child arrives late at the start of the school day, it is very disruptive to their learning and the learning of their classmates.


10 minutes late to school every day adds up. It is the same as losing 6.5 days of school each year.

- •Sound books please practice all of the sounds/words with your child and ensure their sound book is in their book bag every day.






Reading daily at home can have an tremendous impact on your child's progress!

- 20 minutes per day
- 3,600 minutes per school year
- 1,800,000 words per year



Student B Reads

- 5 minutes per day
- 900 minutes per school year
- 282,000 words per year



Student C Reads

- 1 minute per day
- 180 minutes per school year
- 8,000 words per year

Writing


In Term 1, emphasis is placed upon;


- holding pencil correctly snappy fingers!
- forming letters correctly using a cursive font chalking outside, damp sand, tracing, pens and whiteboards etc.
- writing first name correctly.

This progresses onto writing simple words and sentences.


All our Literacy skills are taught through the Read Write Inc Phonics program







Children will be using an increasingly cursive script, using their phonics to hear and write the sounds in words, composing their own sentences and beginning sentences with a capital letter and ending them with a full stop by the end of the year!

Phonics

- Is taught daily.
- The children are taught the letter sounds through Read, Write, Ink Phonics- the children respond well to this active style of learning.
- The children are taught the letter shape, sound and how to write the letter.
- Each letter sound has a picture and a caption to help them remember it.
- The children are taught the pure sound for each letter.



Assessment

- In the Foundation Stage, assessment is carried out through spontaneous and focused observations and adult led activities.
- Photographs and videos are taken as a record of the children's achievements.
- · Assessments are entered on to Evidence Me.
- The children will complete a 'Baseline assessment' once they have settled into school. This is a simple game on an iPad that checks what they know already.
- In June we complete the 'Early Years Foundation Stage Profile- EYFSP, which measures progress

in the 17 areas of early learning.

- Parents are always welcome to come and see us at a time with any queries or concerns. Please contact us through the office.
- Bring your child's book bag to school each day for letters, books etc.
- Home learning will be shared in your child's home book. It will share with you what we have been learning during the week and activities you can complete at home. It will also tell you what we will be learning in the week ahead!
- We may also complete some home learning tasks through the Purple Mash learning platform.

 Home books, reading and sound books will come home weekly in your child's book bag- usually on a Friday.



General Information

- Fruit is available everyday for the children's snack.
- Free milk is available until your child's fifth birthday. After this time you can order milk for your child through the 'Cool Milk' scheme through the school office.
- Named water bottles no squash or juice in the classroom please.
- Lunchtime is at 12.00pm 1.00pm The children have their sandwiches or hot meals in the hall.
- All children in Reception are entitled to Universal Free School Meals. Menus are available

on the school website, meals ordered 2 weeks in advance. Children can still bring packed lunches if you prefer. All children eat together.

Our reception reward system!

For the first terms we use a reward and sanction system in the classroom All children begin the week on 'Blue skies'.

For working hard, listening, concentrating well, showing kindness and consideration to others and being helpful for example, they are moved up the reward system- to 'Sunshine', 'The Rainbow' and finally onto 'The Pot of Gold!'

If they get to the 'Pot of Gold' they get a certificate at the end of the day and can choose a treat from 'The treat tin of tat!'

However if they consistently break the class rules by making poor choices or being unkind to others then they are moved down- to 'Cloudy skies', then the 'Raincloud' and finally onto the 'Thunder cloud'.

If they have moved onto the 'Thunder cloud' then we speak to parents at the end of the day about what has happened, the child will have sat on the 'Thinking chair' to think abut their poor choices and what they might do better next time and miss play time outside, holding the teacher's hand.

In term 5 we begin to use Class Dojos to get the children

ready for Year One.















Class Dojo

Class Dojo is a reward system that we use for our pupils- in reception from term 5.

Dojo points are awarded to pupils when they meet one of the Dojo criteria.

These may be given for:
Homework (3 points)

Reading (3 points)

Spelling score 100% (3 points)

Target Maths score 100% (3 points)

Determination (1 point)
Listen to people (1 point)
Be honest (1 point)
Be kind and helpful (1 point)
Work hard (1 point),
Look after property (1 point)
Love each other as God loves you (1 point).
